Comprehensive Needs Assessment

Webb Elementary is an EE-5 campus with an enrollment of 348 students. The low income percentage is 77.2%. The campus received a Recognized rating. Needs

Based on The Parental Involvement Evaluation, areas needing improvement were: 1) Informing parents about the right to request the qualifications of their child's teacher; 2) Inform parents that they should be notified if their child is taught for four consecutive weeks by a teacher who does not meet "highly qualified" standards. Based on The Opinion Survey for Parents, areas needing improvement were: 1) Students showing respect for each other; 2) Parents feeling that their students' personal belongings left at school are safe. Based on The Instructional Quality Survey, areas needing improvement were: 1) Parents awareness of classroom instructional goals; 2) Continuity across grade levels and programs.

Facilities

Two areas identified on the Comprehensive Needs Survey include stripes on faculty parking and repair of the South Entry Doors. Facilities are very well kept! The need is for continual upkeep. The district has a comprehensive maintenance and facility plan to allow for improvement in student performance.
